SMARTEST "FISH" IN THE SEA By Joe Buff

Over the whole past century, America's Silent Service has succeeded because of two constants. One is the greatness of the men who crew the boats in each generation. The other is the use of torpedoes ("fish") as one of attack sub's key armaments. any Torpedoes, like people, through pass generations as decades pass. The smartest fish in the sea, today and tomorrow, is unquestionably the U.S. Submarine Force's brand-new Mod 7 of the Mark 48 Improved Advanced Capability (ADCAP) heavyweight, wire-quided torpedo.

But first, let's look at the alleged competition.

Lately there's been a brouhaha over the Russian 300-knot rocket propelled torpedo, the Shkval. Variants are now in the hands of China and Iran. Against a surface ship, a Shkval could be a formidable weapon. But against a U.S. Navy sub, these ultra-fast torpedoes don't really cut it. The basic design is a throwback to the late 1960s, when the Soviet weapons were nuclear armed. As such, Shkvals lacked any target homing sensors in the modern context. Recent attempts by the Kremlin to introduce a conventionally armed and properly guided, updated mod of the Shkval face serious engineering and tactical obstacles. For homing sonar to work, the Shkval must slow down to regular torpedo speeds, making it vulnerable to standard U.S. submarine countermeasures maneuvers, and the coming miniaturized ATT -- the anti-torpedo torpedo, for which working test models already exist. Worse, the shape of a rocket torpedo, needed to achieve its "supercavitating" underwater high speed, is poorly suited for mounting sonar suites; the

Shkval is a long cone which comes to a small and sharp point. Its own velocity blinds the Shkval, making it in practice a pretty dumb weapon.

Now let's check out the Mark 48 Mod 7. Its nose is a sizeable acousticallytransparent window, behind which are active and passive sonars of remarkable sophistication. The latest improvements to the sonars allow a much wider frequency range for simultaneously taking in broadband and tonals that give away a lurking or fleeing targeted enemy sub, even a quiet diesel. Just as important, the Mod 7 has been given a whole new computer brain, to interpret those sonar inputs and make brilliant autonomous decisions while in the race to catch and kill its This was done by moving to "open architecture software," a fancy way of saying that it's easy to update the fish's programming in general, and quite simple to load in detailed instructions for a specific type of attack mission. Reportedly, a single crewman with a laptop and a connector cable could reconfigure a torpedo room full of Mod 7s in barely an hour. One available configuration of crucial indeed is a littoral-optimized combination of sonar signal processors and artificial intelligence. The Mod 7 is still wireguided, except now the wire is a fiber optic cable, allowing a quantum leap in bandwidth (data rate) for communication between weapons techs on the parent sub and their units in the water.

All this goes to make the latest generation Mark 48 by far the smartest "fish" anywhere in the sea.

On Saturday July the 8th, STEAMBOAT'S Picnic will be held at his mountain estate. All shipmates are welcome. Bring a dish to share,



Submariner Pay and Teddy Roosevelt

Teddy Roosevelt was a man of many firsts. He was the first President to ride in a car and fly in an airplane. He was also the first American President to board a submarine and make a dive. Onboard USS Plunger (SS-2) on 25 August 1905, he ventured off Long Island Sound for this historic cruise (this was during the time when he was helping to negotiate an end to the Russo-Japanese War, which would earn him the Nobel Peace Prize, another Presidential first). During the cruise, the submarine remained beneath the surface (which was being lashed by a heavy rain) long enough for the President to watch fish swim past his window. Then, taking the controls, Teddy conducted several maneuvers himself, including one which brought the boat to the surface, rear end first. USS Plunger was the second submarine in the US Navy and was commissioned in September of 1903. Because of this "patrol", Teddy was instrumental in submariner's pay and he was always known for getting things done. The Navy did not consider submarine duty either unusual or hazardous, but classified it as nothing more than ordinary shore duty. This meant that the sailors on board earned 25% less pay than sailors received for duty on a destroyer, cruiser, etc. After the two hours that Roosevelt had spent on the submarine, he considered this to be unfair. He found submariners to be trained to

the highest standards and that their work was both strenuous and dangerous. Shortly after returning to shore Teddy decided that there must be a change in the pay structure for the men serving on submarines and issued an Executive Order for the pay change. He directed that submarine officers be paid the same as those on surface ships, while qualified enlisted men should receive an extra \$10 per month in addition to the normal pay of their rating. They were also to receive an additional \$1 per day for each day the boat was submerged while underway. Unqualified enlisted men received an additional \$5 per month. So, the next time you think back on the extra money you earned in the sub service, remember to think about the man that made it happen.

Theft of important Veterans information With the theft of computer data that contained important personal information of over 26 million Veterans there has arisen a justifiable level of concern. The letter that follows contains details of types of information stolen and appropriate courses of action that can be taken to address your concerns. As of the date of this newsletter there has been no evidence of improper use of the stolen information.

VA's Notification to Veterans

Dear Veteran:

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has recently learned that an employee took home electronic data from VA, which he was not authorized to do and was in violation of established policies. The employee's home was burglarized and this data was stolen. The data contained identifying information including names, social security numbers, and dates of birth for up to 26.5 million veterans and some spouses, as well as some disability ratings. As a result of this incident, information identifiable with you was potentially exposed to others. It is important to note that the affected data did not include any of VA's electronic health records or any financial information.

Appropriate law enforcement agencies, including the FBI and the VA Inspector General's office, have launched full-scale investigations into this matter. Authorities believe it is unlikely the perpetrators targeted the items because of any knowledge of the data contents. It is possible that they remain unaware of the information which they possess or of how to make use of it.

Out of an abundance of caution, however, VA is taking all possible steps to protect and inform our veterans. While you do not need to take any action unless you are aware of suspicious activity regarding your personal information, there are many steps you may take to protect against possible identity theft and we wanted you to be aware of these. Specific information is included in the attached question and answer sheet. For additional information, VA has teamed up the Federal Trade Commission and has a website (www.firstgov.gov) with information on this matter or you may call 1-800-FED-INFO (1-800-333-4636). The call center will operate from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. (EDT), Monday-Saturday, as long as it is needed.

We apologize for any inconvenience or concern this situation may cause, but we at VA believe it is important for you to be fully informed of any potential risk resulting from this incident. Again, we want to reassure you we have no evidence that your protected data has been misused. We will keep you apprised of any further developments. The men and women of VA take our obligation to honor and serve America's veterans very seriously and we are committed to seeing this never happens again. Sincerely, R.
